Also in the clubs of his hometown Julius Naschelsky was active: 1922 and 1923, the newspaper reported about honors for his work in the gun club and the Red Cross.

After the seizure of power by the National Socialists Julius Naschelsky was arrested on 30.6.1933 of the local NSDAP Gudensberg and brought to Karlshof in Wabern. There he was severely mistreated. After three days, he returned to Gudensberg and stood first in his home under house arrest, before moving to Charles Hospital in Kassel and a few days later to the court prison at the king came. From 07.16.1933 to 15.10.1933, he was again placed in his house in Gudensberg under house arrest. This measure was taken to ensure that the public was unaware of the severe mistreatment of Jewish citizens.

The family was planning to emigrate now to live for years in the United States brother Julius Naschelsky. On 11 10 1933 was published in the newspaper Gudensberger show: Fortzugshalber I ask all those who should still have claims on me to report to the mayor's office Gudensberg. Julius Naschelsky Gudensberg. At 7.1. In 1934, the newspaper reported Gudensberger succinctly: The office building of the bike dealer J. Naschelsky went by purchase into the hands of the company Gebrüder Pilgram.

Naschelsky family could flee on 08.02.1934 in the U.S. and build a new existence. Julius Naschelsky suffered all his life from the effects of abuse suffered.

Victor Stone passed away peacefully at his home in Boulder, CO on November 28, 2010. He was ninety years old. Vic was born on June 19, 1920 in Münster, Germany. In 1937, at the age of sixteen, Vic left Germany and traveled alone to the United States. Nazi edicts had already prohibited him from finishing high school and it was clear that the situation was rapidly worsening for Jews. The rest of his family was still trying to make arrangements to leave Germany and followed within a couple of years.

With limited English, and no job skills, Victor sought out a relative in Herkimer, New York, hoping to obtain a job in a shoe factory. When that job didn't materialize, he followed another job lead and traveled

by train to Holbrook, Arizona where he secured a job at a trading post.

In 1942, Victor enlisted in the United States Army. He served until April 1946. He was dispatched to India and Burma where he served as a postal clerk. Those who knew Vic agree that this is the only military position in which they can imagine him serving.

Upon discharge from the army in 1947, Vic married Margot Nashelsky, also a German immigrant. They had three children, Helen, Philip and Esther and shared their life together until Margot's death in 2003. Their fifty-six year marriage took them all over the world, but not at first.

Margot's parents owned the Ben Franklin store in Fowler, CO, with a thriving metropolitan population of 1,200. Though Margot and Vic were not your typical southeastern Colorado farm family, they quickly assimilated into the community and remained there until they retired to Boulder in 1994. Their Ben Franklin store was the hub of the town.

Victor was an intellectual. Reading, ruminating and, at times, pontificating were his passions. In the early 1960's, he was finally able to continue his education. He first attended a community college in La Junta and then obtained a bachelor's degree in Spanish and German from Colorado State University in Pueblo, graduating college at the same time his oldest daughter, Helen, graduated high school.

Victor then started his next career as a teacher in Fowler. He taught Spanish, German, history and geography for almost two decades. Victor was born to be a teacher; he loved sharing his knowledge and enthusiasm about the world.

In 1994, Vic and Margot retired from Fowler, CO to Boulder, CO. They easily navigated this major culture shift. Vic tutored students at Fairview High School in German and Spanish. He played bridge, went to concerts and lectures at CU, attended the opera and read and read and read. He moved to the Meridian after Margot's death where he formed close relationships and was an active participant in the community.

Perhaps it was the immigrant's journey from a large German city to small United States towns to India and Burma that inspired Victor's passion for history, geography and travel. He and Margot visited every continent except Antarctica. The Diaspora brought members of the Nashelsky family to South America. Vic and Margot visited every country in South America except Venezuela. Vic's mastery of Spanish made Mexico a frequent destination. All it took was a call from their travel agent that China was opening to tourism and off they went. From African safaris to Cuba, Vic and Margot were the consummate travelers. They returned twice to Germany at the invitation of German organizations working to reconcile with the Jewish refugees. They always returned from their travels with fascinating tales, not quite focused photos and select trinkets. Almost every object in Victor's home represents a story from around the world. And Vic was a storyteller.

When Victor learned his death was relatively imminent, he used his final month to visit with family and old friends. He was full of reminiscences, but no regrets. Victor was the first to say he had lived a long, rich life. He was never bitter about lost opportunities. His family and friends will deeply miss his dry wit, intelligence and curiosity about everything.

Vic is survived by his daughter, Helen Stone of Boulder, CO, his son Philip Stone and Phil's wife, Mary Kay, of Colorado Springs, CO, his grandson Aaron, granddaughter Lia and three great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his wife, Margot, his daughter Esther and his brother Ernest.

Joan Bartholomew was born on January 19, 1939 in Danville, PA, and was the daughter of Wesley and Clementine Bartholomew. She grew up in Philadelphia, PA. She graduated from Albert Einstein Medical Center School of Nursing in 1959. Joan enlisted in the United States Army, received her commission as a 2nd Lieutenant, and was stationed at Letterman Army Hospital in San Francisco, CA.

Lt. Bartholomew was gorgeous, and met the dashing Dr. Gunter Nashelsky on a blind date on October 4, 1960. He was 12 years older, physician to the stars at the Fairmont Hotel, and hadn't yet found the one. They were married by three rabbis in San Franciso after a two-month courtship, attended only by two of Gunter and Joan's closest friends. Joan and Gunter moved to Denver, CO in 1970 and to Scottsbluff in 1975. Joan received a Bachelor's Degree in Anthropology from the University of Denver and a Master's Degree in Counseling from Chadron State College. In Scottsbuff, Joan returned to her nursing roots as a counselor and recruiter for the University of Nebraska Medical Center College of Nursing, Scottsbluff division. She also worked as a nursing instructor at Nebraska Western College and served on the Scottsbluff Board of Education. Dogs became a consuming hobby, and Joan established Shalom Kennels in rural Crawford, NE and, later, rural LaGrange, WY. Gunter was a reluctant breeder, balancing Joan's relentless enthusiasm. He eventually came around (of course), and they made a go of it. Joan specialized in very small dogs well suited to be companions for elderly individuals. Incrementally declining health finally brought about their retirement in 2005.

Since January 2008, Joan and Gunter were proud and active residents of the Western Nebraska Veterans Home. Joan was elected Chairperson of the Members' Council in summer 2008. She was committed to this new leadership role, and approached it with her usual zest.

Joan is survived by her husband Gunter of Scottsbluff, son Marcus (Joan) of Iowa City, IA, daughter-in-law Wendy Nashelsky and grandchildren Davey, Shayna, Cory and Scott of Ft. Collins, CO. Joan and Gunter's son David died in June 2008.
